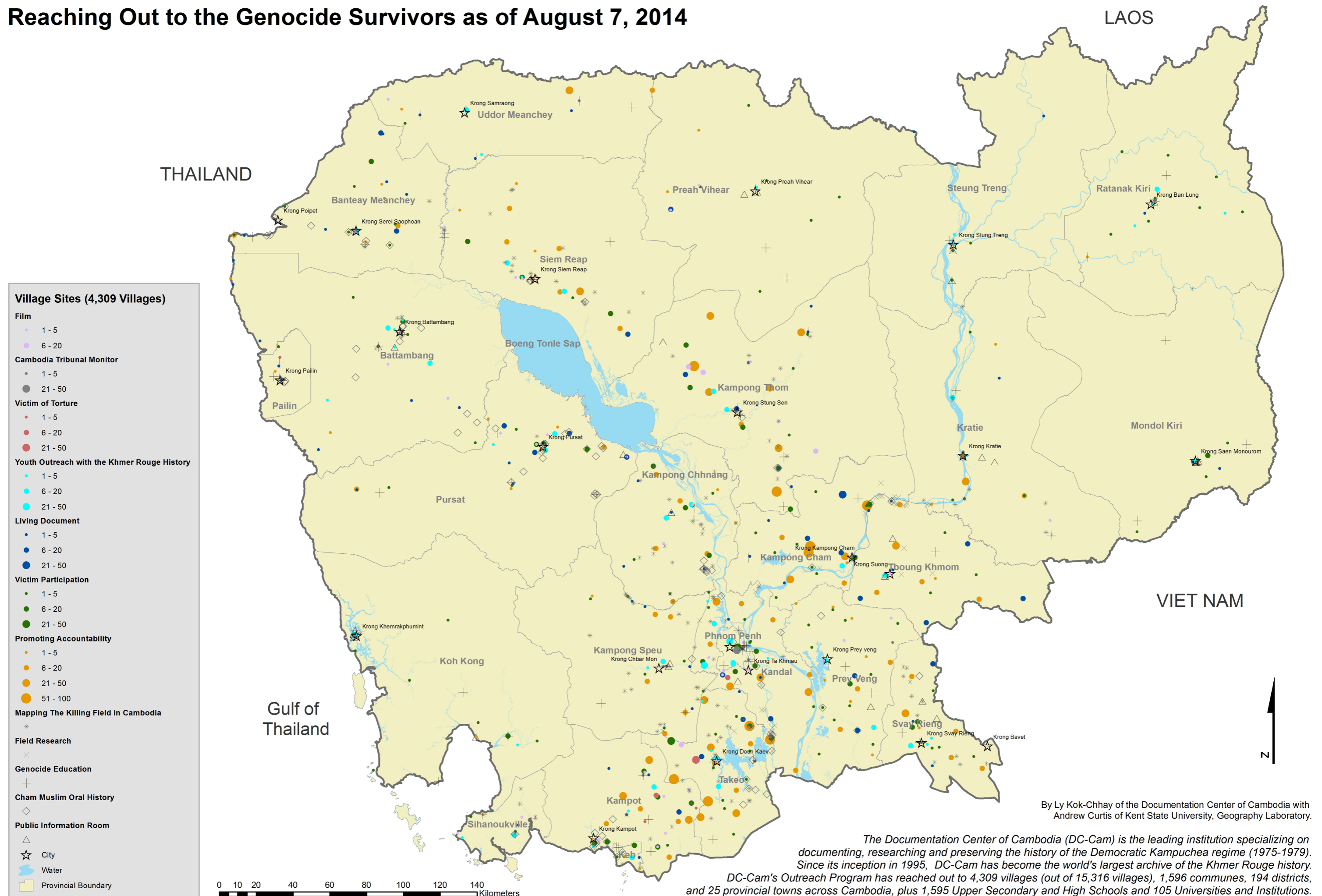

The Documentation Center of Cambodia (DC-Cam) is the leading institution specializing in documenting, researching and preserving the history of the Democratic Kampuchea regime (1975-1979). Since its inception in 1995, DC-Cam has become the world's largest archive of the Khmer Rouge history. DC-Cam's Outreach Program has reached out to 4,309 villages (out of 15,316 villages), 1,596 communes, 194 districts, and 25 provincial towns across Cambodia, plus 1,595 Upper Secondary and High Schools and 105 Universities and Institutions.
